GREETINGS FROM PASTOR NORM

MISSION 2007

GLOWING and GROWING in the Light of the Lord!

GLOWING. The light of Christ glows in us and through us when we gather each week for worship, where the Good News of God's grace is proclaimed through Word and Sacrament. This is where our life together is centered and celebrated. But this is only the beginning, as we "go in peace" to serve the Lord and to bear Christ's love to the world.

We glow when we let our lights shine by reaching out to share through our Helping Hands Food Pantry, Adopt-A-Family programs, Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner deliveries, and Angel Tree toy collection for the children of those who are incarcerated. Throughout the year our Helping Hands Food Pantry collects and distributes food to needy families, and underwear and toiletries to ex-offenders who are returning to the community at the end of their sentence. In addition, during the last few weeks we provided 30 Thanksgiving meals and 37 Christmas dinners, adopted 5 families (28 people) who needed a helping hand during the holiday season, and provided Christmas gifts for 23 children who have a parent in jail or prison. (Another Ascent article provides more of the details.) Carol Anwar, Eileen Imwalle, Denise Khoo, and Pam Nielsen coordinated these activities and did much of the work, and we owe each of them our deepest thanks. But every one of you who bought Thanksgiving pies, Christmas jars, or Christmas jewelry, or made a cash donation helped to brighten the lives of so many people. We have much to celebrate. The Light of Christ is truly shining at Ascension.

GROWING. There are different ways in which a congregation can grow. We can grow in the number of our members, and we have been

welcoming newcomers to our community of faith here at Ascension. We can grow in the stewardship of the financial resources we share for mission and ministry, and there are initial signs of growth in this area. We can also grow individually in our spiritual walk in the Light of the Lord, and it is in this area that I propose we concentrate our efforts for 2007 by creating a program that I am calling "5x5x5."

5x5x5

For 2007 we have identified 5 couples (5) who will serve as small group leaders. They are Doris and Tom Williams, Carol and Warren Werling, Denise and Keith Khoo, Ellen and Jim Harris, and Pam and Pastor Norm Dake. These five couples will each recruit five additional people (5x5), who may be active members, inactive members, or non-members. These small groups will commit themselves to meeting together for five months (5x5x5) on a bi-weekly or semi-monthly basis to do two things: 1) Read Scripture and 2) Pray.

1) Read Scripture. Each group may decide for itself what portions of Scripture they wish to read. It may be a book of the Bible. It may be the lessons for the upcoming Sundays. It may be the lessons and sermon for the most recently past Sundays. It may be a Biblical theme (for example: prayer, forgiveness, love, stewardship, hope, faith, etc.).

2) Prayer. Each group is encouraged to set aside time when it is gathered together, as well as between sessions, to pray—to pray with and for each other, to pray for the ministry of Ascension Lutheran Church, and to pray for the mission of the larger church.

It is my recommendation that these groups meet within the homes of the group members. Although we have plenty of space at 4803 S. Lewis, meeting in our homes is a way to remind ourselves that our

life of faith is not confined to the walls of our congregational facilities.

Each group can decide if it wishes to augment its gatherings with food or refreshments. There are a number of possibilities: breakfast/lunch/dinner and Scripture and prayer, dessert and Scripture and prayer, coffee and Scripture and prayer, or simply Scripture and prayer.

At the end of these five months, it is my hope that we can multiply and re-form these groups for an additional five-month period. Although keeping the same groups together beyond the first five months may seem appealing, re-forming them will allow us to connect with more of our members and strengthen the networks which are so important to the life and ministry of this congregation.

It is my hope that we can gather the five lead couples for orientation in January, with the groups beginning to meet in February. If you don't want to wait to be invited to join a group, you are welcome to identify with the group of your choice. If you don't get invited to join any of the groups and are feeling left out, please let me know. We will either squeeze you into one these five groups, or, if there is sufficient need, we will multiply the groups at the beginning.

Church Council Minutes - From December 10, 2006

Meeting called to order at 12:30pm with Jim Harris presiding; also in attendance were Pastor Dake, Keith Khoo, Chris Falkensten, Eileen Imwalle, Lillian Cantrell, Sandy Isakson and Barbara James.

Minutes from Council meeting on November 12th were approved by unanimous vote.

Committee Reports Presented:

Pastor's Report:

- Pastor provided information on general church activity and the support and care provided to its members over the past month.
- Two new couples joined our church in past month.

Treasurer's Report:

- November, 2006 finances reviewed and approved by council as presented.
- Treasurer's Report is available for review – posted on bulletin board outside office.
- Council discussed year end Benevolence Payment to Synod. Original motion made to forward

additional \$900 to current \$900 sent in July – motion failed 2/ 6. New motion made and 2nd to send balance of budget amount (additional \$2725) – motion passed 8/0. Please note, synod benevolence payment does require us to draw from saving account since not supported by contributions from congregation; but Council felt that it was important and necessary.

Christian Education: Holiday Program is complete and ready.

Evangelism: No report presented.

Worship and Music: No report presented.

Stewardship: No report presented.

Property:

- Several interior leaks were note during thaw of snow; being addressed by Committee; reminder, if there is anything you note that needs attention, please advise church office of a council member.

Mutual Ministry / Helping Hands:

- 5 families (28 individuals) to be adopted during this Holiday Season; thanks to all for their support of this great program.

- Jar and Canning Fundraiser – over 300 have been made and sold – tremendous and thanks.
- Toys for 23 children from our Angel Tree Program.
- Several pledges and gifts from the Ascension Christmas Gift Catalog have also been received and will be implemented.

Continuing Business:

Nominating Committee provided list of candidates for upcoming year; vote to ratify at Annual Congregational Meeting on January 28th – Agenda to be sent under separate cover.

2007 draft budget discussed and ready for Congregation review and acceptance in January.

New Business:

Look for introduction of 5X5X5 program to foster greater fellowship and draw new members to our Congregation – more details to follow as preparations are completed.

January Council meeting will be held Sunday, 1/14, following Traditional Worship service.

Closing prayer provided by Pastor Dake - for thanksgiving, healing and comfort of Ascension Members, families in need and the future of our Church.

Meeting adjourned.

Decoding the Liturgy 101, Part 5

“It’s Sunday morning, what shall I wear?” Both lay and clergy worship leaders have worn special, distinctive garments, known as vestments, when performing liturgical functions since Old Testament times. Vestments have several basic purposes. They designate particular liturgical functions, and place less visual emphasis on the person and greater emphasis on the role being carried out, in order that attention may be given to God rather than the *person* of the worship leader. Second, their beauty reflects and witnesses to the beauty, majesty, and splendor of God. Third, they reflect the continuity of Christian worship throughout history. The colors of the vestments follow the church calendar of seasons.

The *alb* is a white ankle-length garment with close-fitting sleeves. It is the church’s oldest and most basic garment, whose name comes from the Latin word *albus*, which means white, and symbolizes the purity, light, and glory of the resurrected Christ. Because it is derived from the white baptismal garment, the alb may be worn by both laity and clergy.

The alb is gathered at the waist by a *cincture*, a white rope or heavy white cord tied at the side or front. As a sign of their ordination into pastoral or priestly work, ordained clergy wear a stole over their alb. A long, narrow band of heavy fabric, the stole is a symbol of the yoke of obedience to Christ. It is placed through, or tucked under the cincture, and the color is appropriate for the day or season in the liturgical year.

When Holy Communion is celebrated, the presiding minister usually wears a *chasuble* over the alb. This garment is a “full” vestment, worn like a poncho over the alb and stole. The fullness of the chasuble suggests that the eucharistic meal is intended to embrace all baptized people. Chasubles are made of a wide variety of beautiful fabrics. Their symbolism is in their fullness and color, and their color is to coordinate in hue with the paraments, in the color appointed for the day.

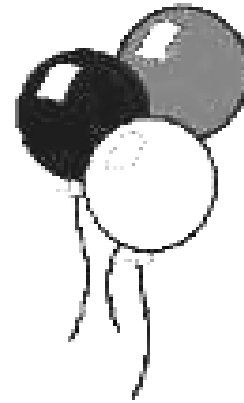

Adopt-A-Family Program

Adopt-A-Family adopted a total of 28 people this year (five families). Along with donations given, we raised money by making and selling a total of 376 jars, and we also sold pies at Thanksgiving to raise funds needed. I would like to share with Ascension's members a little bit about the families we adopted and what sorts of gifts we were able to provide. These profiles are condensed versions of what we received from the counselors who work directly with the families.....Carol Anwar

Family #1 (6 members):

This family has a single dad and his 5 children. Mental health services are being provided to the children due to the extreme circumstances this family has been exposed to. The family relocated to Tulsa in Aug 2005 following Hurricane Katrina. They survived 7 days in the Superdome before evacuating to Camp Gruber, OK. During the chaos of the Superdome evacuation, the youngest brother was separated from the rest of the family. Inexplicably, he was sent to Dallas while his family was sent to Oklahoma. Fearing the worst, the family spent an entire month searching for their youngest son! Several months after this family was reunited in Tulsa, they were involved in a very serious car accident. The oldest girl is currently in a wheelchair due to the hip injuries caused by the accident. The financial situation for the family is very difficult. They struggle to pay for rent, utilities, food, clothes, and medical needs. They lost their car in the accident. With the help of a therapist, the family is slowly beginning to deal with their traumatic experiences and losses (all of the personal, household and family possessions). The children are making academic progress and developing coping skills. The children had feared that they would be forgotten this Christmas and not even have a single gift or toy to unwrap, and certainly no extra food for a Christmas dinner.

Here are some items we provided: food for a Christmas dinner, groceries, blankets, sheets, towels, dishes, silverware, used microwave, pans, toilet paper, kitchen items, socks, church clothes, books, general clothing, toys.

Family #2 (7 members):

This family has a single mother, five children, and an 81 year old grandmother who is ill with emphysema. The entire family is currently supported by the grandmother's social security and mother's food stamps. The children's father is not providing any support. The mother has been employed, but is currently having to take care of the ill grandmother and a new baby, so hasn't been able to work temporarily. The grandmother was recently hospitalized and mom has had to shuttle children back and forth to school, plus go to the hospital to see after her grandmother. The family lives in a 2 bedroom house in a deteriorating neighborhood. There are several boarded up homes nearby which are frequented by drug users and crime is high in the neighborhood. The mother works very hard in these difficult circumstances to make sure the kids get a good education and make good choices. The mother is a high school graduate, who hopes to attend college to study business, and that is one of her goals. Recently, before the snow and ice hit Tulsa, the thermostat broke and the home had no heat. There was no money to fix it, as their money can barely meet the most basic needs.

Here are some items we provided: sheets, towels, dishes, 3 blankets, 2 sweaters and a pair of pants for each child, winter coats for each child, toys, books, diapers, warm clothes for the 2 adults, socks.

Family #3 (6 members):

This family has a mom and dad who both work full-time. They struggle to make ends meet, but their incomes do not always allow them to meet even their basic needs. The family provides for their 3 children, but has recently had to take in a nephew to take care for also. Dad works full-time at the VA, and is also a full-time student working on his Criminal Justice degree. Mom has a child care business. Once dad's degree is done, mom is planning on obtaining a cosmetology degree. Mom helps the kids with their homework, and reads to them. She attends all the parent meetings, and also attends additional child-oriented programs offered by Family and Children's Services. She is starting financial literacy classes in January once the other class is finished. This family is very committed to their children, and making a better life for them.

Here are some items we provided: blankets, family games, sweaters, socks, gloves, hats, pants, coats, toys.

Family #4 (5 members):

This family has a mom, an ill grandmother, 2 daughters, and a boyfriend who recently moved to Tulsa to help the family. The mom works full time with a minimum wage job. The grandmother is on partial disability and needs to retire, but has to continue to work part time as a waitress because the family can't survive without the

extra income. The family is hoping to move to a safer neighborhood, and they absolutely cannot do without the grandmother's extra income. The mom's boyfriend very recently moved to Tulsa to try and help the family financially and emotionally. He is currently searching for employment, and this will hopefully help the family once he can find a job. The entire family is involved in FCS family support services. The daughters are making progress in their academic skills, and stress management and coping skills are being taught through FCS. The children are so excited, talking about what gifts they may receive. The family would not have been able to provide gifts or a special dinner without the help of a donor.

Here are some items we provided: groceries, food for a Christmas meal, clothing, lots of books, family games, cookbook, toys.

Family #5 (3 members, plus a baby due in March):

This family has a mom and a 16 and 4 year old boy. A baby is due in March. The husband recently left the family and the mother has to work alone to support the children. She has a job, and is also a vice-president of the PTAG at her son's school. She attends all the parent meetings and is involved at the school. She helps her children with their homework and is trying to provide emotional support for the boys since their father left.

Here are some of the items we provided: a winter coat, books, toys, bikes, stroller, baby clothes, pots and pans, sweater.

Two of these 313 homes were built right in Tulsa. And, thanks to you and everyone involved, the Nicole Vann and Lester Flatt families now has a new home. You helped change their lives. And I'm sure many of you who worked side-by-side with the Vann and Flatt families, would agree that the experience changed your lives too.
